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OVERVIEW

The People's Republic of China is the world's most populous nation with a country of over 1.35 billion people. Since its economic reforms in 1978, China has become one of the world's fastest growing economies. It often is regarded as an Asian powerhouse. While its rapid economic expansion has helped large cities such as Beijing, Shanghai and Chongcheng, there are still many rural areas that lack the basic necessities such as proper sanitation, healthcare, education and welfare.

Muestra de Camellia (Muestrada) is a group of 19 students from the Nanyang Technological University Muslim Society (NTUMS) wing which is heading to Yang Tzai Village in Yunnan, China. It is mountainous region where the main sources of income are agriculture and farming. Muestrada plans to be in China from 26th May to 09th June 2014. It is the 3rd time that NTUMS has gone to Yunnan, China, collaborating with the same organization in providing humanitarian efforts. This initiative is endorsed and supported by the National Youth Council (NYC) and NTU Student Affairs Office (SAO). Through this initiative, we hope to embark on a journey of self-discovery and maturity into responsible young adults while increasing our compassion and sharing our joy with the less fortunate.

Our project focuses on two aspects; Education and Refurbishment. For the education aspect, we hope to share knowledge and skills with youths, of age ranging from 4 to 7 year olds in the school village. We plan to impart elementary English and Arabic Language skills, simple Art & Craft and Physical Education (Games) aimed towards holistic education and cultivating the love for learning for the young minds. The curriculum is planned out with the hope that the ideas and concepts explored would initiate a thirst for knowledge in the students. In addition, our education syllabus also includes proper hygiene practices, a skill that is almost inaccessible in the village, yet especially important considering the living conditions in a rural village. As for refurbishment, the exterior walls of the school will be painted to provide an attractive and conducive environment for the young children to learn, which can spur enthusiasm and pride in the students. Also, we aim to establish closer understanding and strengthen ties between Chinese and Singaporean students through an elaborate cultural immersion day where we will celebrate cultural diversity.



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PROFILE OF ORGANISING TEAM (NTUMS):

Nanyang Technological University Muslim Society (NTUMS), Singapore

NTUMS has always taken an active role in the local community. It undertakes different projects throughout the year. Its main objective is to facilitate the holistic development of its members- spiritually, morally, mentally, physically and intellectually. Its mission is summed up in the following three statements;

"Outreach to local/international community. Develop our Muslims to become strong, capable and compassionate leaders. Promote an Islamic Environment for our Muslims in NTU and NIE."

4 main dimensions of NTUMS activities:

- 1) Outreach To reach out to the local and international Muslim as well as Non-Muslim communities in NTU/NIE to raise awareness of Islam on campus.
- 2) Development To provide our members with platforms to develop themselves holistically and to hone their leadership and organizational skills.
- 3) Welfare and Humanitarian To develop compassionate members and instil a desire to contribute back to the community, be it locally or overseas.
- 4) Services To provide basic services in facilitating a conducive environment for Muslims on campus.

Since 1987, NTU Muslim Society has created several platforms for NTU undergraduates to contribute in their own ways while helping them to develop themselves as better leaders in their own niche. PELITA, which stands for "People Expressing the Light of Islam Through Actions" (and also means candle in Malay), was initiated by NTUMS in 2006 as a humanitarian wing which provides an avenue to those who are keen in contributing towards society in both the local and overseas terrain. To date, PELITA has sent a total of twelve expedition teams to countries such as Cambodia, Indonesia and China. Apart from the annual OHE, another notable project would be "Project Yusra" – the local humanitarian wing of NTUMS; aiding the physically and socially challenged as well as the elderly.



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PROJECT NAME & TEAM MOTTO

Our team name *Muestra de Camellia* consist of two parts; "Muestra de" which in Spanish means "Token of" and "Camellia" which was the floral emblem of an ancient southern Kingdom of China, which is Yunnan as we know today. This flower is still one of the most popular and respected flowers in Southwest China. The 'Camellia' in China symbolizes an 'everlasting love' and 'devotion' to another person. Hence, the project name, Muestra de Camellia means the "Token of Everlasting Love". This name resonates strongly with our desire to be the token of everlasting love to the people of Yang Tzai village. Moreover, the Camellia flower in general symbolizes steadfastness and excellence, thus, an attribute that our team aspires to emulate.

Our main beneficiaries in Yang Tzai Village are children between the ages of 4 to 7 years old. Being young individuals, we hope that our project would have a positive impact on their lives; imparting valuable skills and knowledge while leaving everlasting memories. Our tagline, "*Blooming opportunities, Blossoming possibilities*" depicts the children as young buds. Given the right nourishment of water and light, they will bloom and blossom into a beautiful flower. These 'nourishments' characterize the learning opportunities for the children and providing them with diverse experiences, made possible by the different activities prepared for them. Thus, we hope to provide avenues for these young minds to discover their abilities and passions through learning.



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PROJECT VISION

While Project YangTzai II aims to impact the lives of the children of Yang Tzai, our main aim is to develop our members individually and as a team. We hope to foster bonds that are closely knitted within ourselves beyond this project. This expedition project will provide as an ideal opportunity for them to open up their hearts and minds towards serving and improve the lives of the less fortunate.

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PROIECT DESCRIPTION

Main Project

Location: Yang Tzai Village Kindergarten, Yunnan Province, China

Dates: 26 May 2014 – 09 June 2014

Description:

Yang Tzai Village Kindergarten caters to children between the ages of 4 to 7 years old. It currently has 150 students with 12 permanent staffs. Project Yang Tzai II is the continuation of Project Yang Tzai from a team of NTU students in 2011. Yang Tzai Village kindergarten has also hosted teams from SMU for 3 continuous installations, named Project Xing Fu I, II and III. This ensures continuity in the local (SMU & NTU) student's involvement with the host organization, thereby fitting their master plan. The kindergarten is located in rural Yunnan where poverty is widespread. The facilities available are to the minimum. It is hoped that Team Muestra de Camellia would be able to transform the lives of the children there by creating a more conducive atmosphere for learning. This would be executed in 2 main stages.

Firstly, it is through a specially tailored educational programme that stimulates the children's desire for knowledge through songs, dance and colourful flash cards. With the kindergarten located in the rural areas, sanitation is poor. Hence we have also included "Hygiene Awareness" in our programme. It is hoped that through these programmes, good habits in both learning and hygiene would be properly inculcated in the children.

Secondly, providing an attractive and fresh façade for the kindergarten would have a positive impact on brightening the children's learning environment. Currently, the kindergarten exterior walls are white and bare. Painting the exterior walls with bright colours would certainly give the building a kindergarten look.

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Xiji Welfare Charity Centre is a Non-Governmental Organisation - Charity Organization established in 2006 with the objective of helping the poor in China and to alleviate their economic and educational problems.

Xiji Charity set up a government registered orphanage in China's poorest region known as XIHAIGU. This region has also been designated as one of the world's poorest regions by UNESCO. Since its inception in November 2006, the orphanage has an enrolment of 34 boys and 21 girls ranging from 8 to 14 years old, all without parents. Because of premise and funds constraints Xiji Charity were only able to take in 55 orphans and employ 5 paid staff.(warden, cook, cleaning cum laundry lady, two teachers, each staff is paid a meagre wage of £50 per month) The orphanage needs a minimum of £1000 a month to sustain its 55orphans' livelihood and paid employees.

Xiji Charity also contributed to their community through other venues. In 2008, they distributed clothes to 800 needy students, bursaries to 50 secondary school students and food supplies to 90 families. In 2009, they gave out annual bursaries to 110 students from poor farming families, giving them an opportunity towards a tertiary education in universities. Xiji Charity hopes that they will graduate and be gainfully employed so that they will help break the poverty circle.

Currently, in the Yang Tzai Village Kindergarten, the school have a total of 150 students aged between 4-7 years old. They also have 12 Full-time Staff (1 Principal, 1 Accountant, 8 Teachers and 2 Cooks). The 1st year students are not required to pay school fees and thus the Kindergarten has to be backed by continual donations to run the school.

The reconnaissance trip to Yang Tzai village in Yunnan, China was conducted from 3rd March 2014 to 8th March 2014. The reconnaissance team consisted of Muhammad Arif Bin Amir (Leader), Mohamad Badruddin Bin Mohamad Sidek (Co-leader) and Muhammad Hanif Bin Abdul Wahab (Refurbishment IC). The purpose of the visit to location is to evaluate the conditions e.g. safety and feasibility to carry out the project at the aforementioned location.

Objectives

To gather as much information on the following areas:

- 1) Conditions of school / facilities at the village (Yang Tzai Village and Zhaotong City)
- 2) Education standards of the students at the school
- 3) Project cost estimation (food, transportation, accommodation etc.)
- 4) Accessibility to medical facilities, market and shops to purchase materials
- 5) Safety and risks of locations

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Reconnaissance Summary

We went to China for our reconnaissance trip with our partner Ms Mariah Mah. Upon reaching Zhaotong, we headed to Yang Tzai Village where the site of the kindergarten was. Ms Mah also acted as our translator. We were greeted by the staff along with some villages. While we were at the kindergarten, Ms Mah explained to us her hopes and vision for the Kindergarten in Yang Tzai. While at the kindergarten, we managed to seek vital informations from the staffs there, especially Mr Daud Ma, the school principal. Our partners have been clear and concise with their need and wants. This tremendously helps us to better understand their needs thus putting us in a better position to offer help. We also had an informal gathering with the village elders where they shared with us their life experiences and their way of life in the village. This allows us to understand the community as a whole.

Besides Yang Tzai village, we also visited many other villages which are part of our partner's master plan, in hopes of passing the information that we gathered during the recce trip as future projects for our team or new OE teams.



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APPENDIX B: Concise Program Details

Objective

Guided by the philosophy that every child deserves the right to learn, Team Muestra de Camellia (*Token of Love*) came up with three main objectives that serve to govern us in the planning of education activities for the expedition. Leveraging on the theme, 'Blooming opportunities, blossoming possibilities', the team aspires to extol the infinite nature of the future, and dare them to dream boldly.

We feel that these universal values could be linked to academic and holistic development through:

- i) Love for myself and others
- ii) Love for Nature
- iii) Love for Knowledge

These values will be imparted through the education syllabus and the refurbishment of Yang Tzai Kindergarten. We hope our efforts will serve as a springboard for progress and further development on the lessons we intend to impart.

Programme structure

The overarching programmes of the team's expedition to China are categorised under the following:

A) Education

B) Refurbishment

Education programmes will be implemented in the morning while Refurbishment will be done throughout the day. Every morning, 12 members will be rotated to teach the 6 classes of students, with 2 members taking 2 classes to teach.

The purpose of these departments is to ensure a specialised effort that maximises the team's efficiency and productivity in the different fields.



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A) Education

Based on the information given by the reconnaissance team regarding the background of the students, the school, as well as the culture of Yang Tzai, Yunnan China, Team Muestra De Camellia has designed a syllabus that aims to imbue the children with fundamental values and skills necessary for success when they move on to public school.

The syllabus is designed in such a manner that students will be engaged in a meaningful learning experience, academically and holistically.

Objectives

- 1. To equip the students with knowledge and skills relevant to their academic life in public school as well as enhance their ability to adapt to their increasingly cosmopolitan and globalised country.
- 2. To inculcate positive learning values and engage students in an interactive learning session in in and out of classrooms.
- 3. To encourage students to love learning

One of the most important considerations during the designing of the education syllabus is to ensure sustainability of knowledge. This is done so by aligning our programmes to our objectives. We also considered the importance of factoring in the relevance and usefulness of our programme's educational content to the students. Therefore, Team Muestra de Camellia has decided to focus on imparting fundamental knowledge and skills: English, and Cleanliness and Hygiene. As for holistic development, students will be engaged in Art & Craft, Sports and Cultural Exchange activities. Lessons will be tailored to suit the needs of the students' respective levels. Yang Tzai Kindergarten consists of 3 grades, attended by approximately 150 girls and boys between 4-7 years old.

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

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

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B) Refurbishment

Yang Tzai Kindergarten exterior outlook does not portray an image of a kindergarten. The building has limited decoration with white as its base colour (see pictures). Our partners and the team has collaborated and agreed that a proper outlook design of a kindergarten is important to provide a conducive environment for learning, encourage villagers to send their children to the school as well as to lighten up and rouse the children's spirit for learning. As such we feel that producing an environment full of vibrant colours and cartoon designs would be beneficial for the kindergarten students, teachers and parents as a whole.

Objectives of Yang Tzai Kindergarten

- a) To create a cheerful and vibrant atmosphere for the children who will be boarding in the school.
- b) To create the love for learning and exploration.
- c) To provide a conducive environment for studying/learning.
- d) To attract the interests of parents to send their sons and daughters to the school.

The team is assigned a primary task of refurbishing and painting the exterior of Yang Tzai Kindergarten, as well as a secondary task of touching up 5 classrooms by recoating the walls. This refurbishment process will be executed over a period of 10 days, starting from 27th May 2014 to 5th June 2014. This includes painting a wall near the entrance, painting the corridors of the main school building, re-coating the paint from the old parts of the building and the classrooms, spring clean the school compound as well as creating a banner for the school to be hung outside the school's kitchen. We will also be painting the school name on the second floor of the building using stencils to finally give the school its identity. The concept of the painting designs will meet all the objectives as stated above.

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APPENDIX D: Pre-expedition Summary (Seeding Phase)

Introduction

For the Pre-expedition Phase which we call the Seeding Phase, the team plans to conduct an educational cum games day programme for a group of 43 pre-school children from Jamiyah Singapore – Global Child Development Centre, aged 4-6 years old. The specific choice of targeted audience is hoped to help us better prepare for our overseas humanitarian project with a boarding kindergarten.

The objectives of this phase include:

- To highlight the importance of reaching out to the local community first before reaching out to a larger overseas community
- To inculcate the values of appreciating self, others and the environment amongst the local children

In addition, we also aim to cater our programme to meet our local partner's goals and objectives for the organisation. In line with our main expedition framework, our pre-expedition activities strive to promote the values of our theme "Love For Self. Love For Others. Love For Environment".



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Programme summary

Seeding Phase (Pre-Expedition Phase) encompasses of 4 main highlights. Like the seeding of a Camellia flower before it grows, the name suggests a starting platform for our team, where they get to explore and discover more about themselves in the process of contributing to society. At the same time, this phase provides an opportunity to promote the importance of saving the environment in the community from a young age.

Outdoor

Seed of Change

This session is to be done as a relay activity whereby participants will be expected to make healthy food choices. The objective is to encourage the awareness of a healthy diet at a young age, as part of our "Love self" theme. We also hope to inculcate the value of gratitude, especially with the easy access to food items as compared to children in other parts of the world.

Seed of Conservation

With the objective of loving nature, this scavenger hunt activity involves participants identifying recyclable items and placing them in the correct type of recycling bin. This is aimed to increase their awareness on ways of protecting the environment.

Indoor

Seed of Creativity

This is a storytelling cum playacting session involving the children. In this story, participants will be brought along on an adventure where they might find themselves facing obstacles before reaching the destination. Songs and visual aids will be used for a better learning experience for the children. The objectives from this session include promoting the values of caring for others and love for nature.

Seed of Compassion

This is an initiative for cultural exchange. The local children will be creating an item during an art and craft activity. These items will be dedicated to the children in Yunnan. Through this initiative, we hope to build bridges between both local and overseas communities based on the values of loving, caring and sharing with others.



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APPENDIX E: Post- Expedition Summary (Blossoming Phase)

Introduction

As a sequel to our overseas experience or our growing phase in Yunnan, China, we hope to share our experiences with the students in the local organization during this Blossoming Phase. This programme hopes to put a proper closure to the project as well as an application phase for the project.

To align with the overall theme of our seeding and blossoming phase "Love for self, Love for others, Love for environment", the objectives of this phase are as follows:

- To encourage a sense of community through teamwork and play
- To develop an understanding of the relationship between self and environment
- To expose the children to different types of activities from a foreign culture
- To instil a sense of appreciation towards the family and friends
- To share and inculcate values learnt throughout among participants and members
- To provide connection for participants and the beneficiaries



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Programme Summary

Blooming phase marks the last part of the expedition and encompasses three main programmes.

1) Indoor Fun

Two hands-on activities which focus on teaching participants basic interpersonal skills will be carried out. The objectives of these activities are to inculcate co-operation among team members and to allow the participants to express ideas and opinions. 

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SECTION E

Emergency Planning

In any overseas travel, emergency plan is a vital part of planning. Members of the team should be aware of the possibilities scenarios where members can be in danger:

- Natural disaster in the area such as earthquake, flooding
- Accident that warrant immediate evacuation of member(s) of the team
- Political or civil unrest

For all students who travel overseas, contact with home base (NTU Contact Person) is critical so that advice and assistance can be sought soonest possible. There must be at least TWO contact persons. Possible communication by:

- Mobile phones with auto-roaming features if there are relay stations for such phones.
- Satellite phones (wilderness with no relay stations)

In areas with no possible contact with NTU Contact Person then consider a local base in the country of travel contact person using

- hand phones with local SIM card, if area of reception permits
- communication sets (shortwave) with local base stations



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• walkie talkie sets, if area of reception permits, with local base

Use of GPS navigation device would also be advantage if affordable; recommended in the remote area where radio frequency signals is poor. (GPS receivers are now integrated in many mobile phones)

It is beneficial to do the following:

- Always register with MFA and local embassy/High Commission of your visit. Register the embassy address and phone number.
- Obtain the nearest hospital or medical facilities.
- Types of medical rescue available.

Safety Protocols and Guidelines

- Buddy system to ensure that one looks out for the other.
- They will report of any problems to the leader, co-leader or safety officers.
- No wandering out of Hotel during R&R by 11 pm China time.
- Always stay in pairs or groups. No wandering around alone.

In case of any disasters:

- 1. Move towards the nearest evacuation centre
- 2. Account for all the members in the expedition team (Leaders & Safety Officer)
- 3. Establish contact with the Singapore embassy and family members
- 4. Arrange for the earliest possible departure (Leaders)



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In case of minor injuries:

- 1. To report injury to Group Leader
- 2. Expedition Leader / Co-leader to be informed
- 3. First Aid to be administered by trained personnel / medic
- 4. Sufficient rest be accorded to injured participant

In case of major injuries:

- 1. Assess the extent of injury and apply first aid to sustain life
- 2. Expedition Leader to be informed immediately
- 3. Arrange for immediate disposal to nearest medical facility
- 4. Establish contact with Next-Of-Kin and if necessary, the Singapore embassy
- 5. 1 Leader & 1safety officer to stay with the participant throughout the medical



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MEDICAL FACILITIES & AUTHORITIES

Clinic

A town hospital run by the Government is available about 3km away from our project site and accommodation. As it is situated in a small town, it's facilities are only good for outpatient treatments, minor injuries and accidents. Although there is no ambulances on standby on site, calling the emergency services hotline at 120 would enable the ambulance to arrive in about 15mins.

Hospital


Major hospitals can only be found in the city of Zhaotong which is approximately 1.5hrs drive from the project site. Zhaotong General Hospital is equipped with medical facilities such as emergency, surgical, central pharmacy and an outpatient clinic. In the serious cases and if there is a need for an aerial evacuation, it is possible for an heli-evacuation to take place due to the availability of open areas in and around the vicinity of the project (from International ISOS).

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




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EVACUATION PROCEDURE FOR ACCIDENTS AND SERIOUS ILL HEALTH






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EVACUATION PROCEDURE FOR POLITICAL UNREST






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
APPENDIX G: Organisational Structure
